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BEFORE YOU GO

There are a few mandatory steps to complete before your expedition cruise in Alaska.

Fill in and return the Ship Manifest Information Form to Hurtigruten

Check your passport
Please ensure your passport has a
minimum of 6 months remaining
validity at the end of your cruise.*

Please make sure that you have the correct visa travel document that is required at the time of your expedition.

Check your travel insurance
A comprehensive travel/health
insurance policy that also covers
medical evacuation is obligatory.

Entry requirements »

Weather and packing

Checking the weather forecast for your destination before you leave is essential to ensuring you are packing appropriate clothes. Make sure you pack suitable clothes for the weather you're returning home to as well.

We recommend you pack:

- Clothes for warm days and clothes for cooler days
- ✓ Insect repellent
- Polarized sunglasses and sunscreen
- A camera (in a waterproof bag)
- ✓ A memory card with a large capacity
- ✓ Wind and water-resistant trousers

- ☑ Lip salve with UV protection
- Swimwear for use in our on-deck pool and hot tubs

Small boat cruising

Although your expedition ship is small, there are limits on where it can go due to its size. This is where our small Zodiac boats come in. Enjoy gliding through the water as you take in the stunning views.

Landings

Whenever weather and sea conditions allow, we'll attempt landings via small Zodiac boat. Once ashore, the Expedition Team will guide you on where to go and what there is to see, and ensure you stay safe at all times.

Hiking*

The Expedition Team run guided hikes to viewpoints and sites of interest. They'll pick some of the most scenic spots around for you to enjoy.

Science Center »

The microscopes and other hightech equipment here allow for hands-on demonstrations and workshops, which deepen your understanding of the places you visit. We also invite you to participate in Citizen Science projects, which in turn contribute to important research.

Kayaking*



Misty Fjords

Part of the two million acres of Tongass National Forest, this is a pristine coastal wilderness of evergreen trees, deep fjords, majestic snow-capped peaks and a wide variety of wildlife.



Wrangell

Step back in time in one of Alaska's oldest and most historic island towns to discover ancient petroglyph carvings and mosscovered totem poles and learn about the local Tlingit people.



Kodiak

This bustling fishing port is home to Alutiiq Museum and Baranov Museum which feature artefacts from both the Russians and the Alutiiq natives who lived here more than 7,000 years ago.



St. Matthews Island

Many pioneers have attempted to settle this island over the centuries but it remains uninhabited, with only seabirds and occasional foxes to wander its black sand beaches.



Icy Bay

Three prominent glaciers feed vast chunks of floating ice into the waters of this bay, where wildlife like humpback whales, orcas, sea lions, seals and otters feed.

Did you know?

The **1,770** km-long Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race is hosted by Alaska every year from Anchorage to Nome. It is often called the "Last great race on Earth."

John Carpenter's 1982 horror classic 'The Thing' is set in Antarctica, but was actually filmed in Alaska.

In Barrow, Alaska, the sun rises on May 10 and doesn't set for three months, as the town experiences 24hour daylight.

Giant vegetables are common in Alaska due to the extremely long days in summer which account for a record cabbage weighing in at 62.6 kgs.

0 is the amount of borders Alaska shares with other US states. Instead it borders with Canada, and it shares a maritime border with Russia.



The early days

It is believed that the ancestors of Alaska's native people arrived by making an arduous journey either via a land bridge that used to connect Asia with the North American continent, or by sea. They managed to settle and survive by hunting on land, and at sea, and by fishing. Hunting and fishing still form a core part of Alaska cultural groups today, even if the sea and the wilds aren't as bountiful as they used to be.

A rich heritage

Now in the 21st century, about 15% of the Alaskan population are Alaska Natives. There are over 220 different tribes of Alaska Natives spread across five geographic areas. Between them, they speak 20 different languages and have 11 distinct cultures. They have done much to preserve traditions like shamanism, as well as handicrafts such as wood carving, needlework and jewellery making. Their proud heritage is in evidence throughout the region, despite the growing influence the modern world has on their lifestyle.

The Aleuts: boats and body art

Living on the Aleutian Islands, the Aleuts are expert hunters and navigators, known for constructing their own boats. They are also skilled crafters, making their own parkas from the skins of seal and sea otter.

Like many other peoples of the Arctic, the Aleuts have a tradition of tattoos and piercings. The Aleuts believe that body art will protect them from evil spirits and please the good ones. Often used to signify their religious views, tattoos also display the accomplishments of their family and their forefathers.

The Haida and Tlingit: totemic ancestry


Both nations are excellent seamen, dependent on the seaways for transport and hunting. They trade frequently with their neighbours and build long cedar canoes for transport and travel. The Haida and the Tlingit have a long tradition of carving totems and ceremonial objects, commonly placed outside the household to show who lived there and to offer a brief explanation of their family history. It is an artform they still practise today.

New challenges to their way of life

With record high temperatures over the past few summers leading to flooding due to rapid ice and snow melt, climate change poses a real threat to Alaska Native communities. Along with heavy fishing along the Alaskan coast, the challenge to maintain their traditional way of life gets tougher with each decade their food supply dwindles.

The advances of modern society have also inevitably influenced the lives of these native people, often enticing their youth to big cities and bright lights. Still, those that remain honour their traditions and culture, sharing them with the next generation, and with all visitors who take an interest.

You'll be able to learn more about these historic nations and their culture, and to meet native communities on an expedition cruise with us to Alaska. We work closely with these communities to make sure our visits are dignified and respectful, mindful of local customs and traditions, and to the mutual benefit of all.



Fauna of the 'Last Frontier'

Nicknamed the 'Last Frontier' for its rugged landscape, Alaska is a wild paradise, offering breath-taking views for its visitors and diverse habitats for its wildlife. Bears fish for salmon in the rivers while deer wander the forests, and many rare bird species can be spotted.

Living waters

The cold waters of Alaska are home to seven whale species, along with the largest dolphin species, the orca. Keep an eye on the sea to catch sight of one of these aquatic giants surfacing. Closer to the coast, look out for sea otters floating in the shallows of Alaska's fjords. Join the locals down at the river to watch the

salmon run; many look forward to this annual event, including bears and bald eagles looking for a free meal

Bustling land

A fearsome predator of spawning salmon, grizzly bears are common in western Alaska. Besides grizzlies, you might also see other kinds of bears. Alaska is home to more than 70% of North America's brown bears. Even more common is the black bear, which, despite its name, is not always black. There are even polar bears among the glaciers in the northern region. Three species of deer roam the forests of Alaska, feeding on the vegetation found within. Look closely to see bald

eagles nesting in the trees and hummingbirds hovering around the flowers. In the tundra, try to see past the camouflage of the spritely Arctic fox.

Remember that these are natural habitats, so we can't guarantee that certain animals will appear during your trip. Mother Nature will do as she pleases, and no sightings can be set in stone.
