Lying just 500 kilometres (310 miles) east of Tierra del

Fuego, the Falklands (Malvinas) archipelago is better described, geologically anyway, as a part of Africa. The islands separated from Africa during the breakup of the super-continent Gondwana millions of years ago and have been moving steadily away at about the speed your fingernails grow. There is evidence to suggest that the Falklands, consisting of two large and around 700 small islands, were initially visited by Yahgans (Yàmana) or other peoples of coastal Patagonia. The first recorded sighting by Europeans was in 1592 by Englishman John Davis sailing in Desire. The islands' motto,

Desire the Right, is a clever play on the ship's name.



> journey. The couple now living on the Island sometimes offers a ten minute, bumpy Land Rover ride instead. Devil's Nose overlooks the sea surrounded by cliffs and is home to several thousand maiestic black browed albatross and several hundred rough and tumble rockhopper penguins. As visitors return from the colony they are invited into the home for a cup of tea or coffee and cakes. The very first cruise vessel to come to the Falklands stopped here in 1968 and the Napiers naturally invited everyone in for tea.

Carcass Island lies to the North West of the Falkland Islands archipelago and takes its name from the HMS Carcass which visited in the late 18th century. At present there is only two all year residents and a few more in the summer, it is the present owners Rob and Lorraine McGill who have lived on the island for about 30 years. They continue the conservationist traditions of the previous owners planting and restoring the tussac grass for use as controlled winter animal grazing areas. There is about 900 sheep on the island, and in addition tourism makes up for income as well. Unlike much of the Falkland Islands Carcass Island is water-rich and has several water resources. A generator gives electricity and the traditional fuel, peat, was replaced recently by the more convenient oil and gas which is delivered by local vessel. At all sites in Carcass a prolific number of shore birds are to be seen. Flightless steamer ducks, Magellanic Penguins, Gentoo Penguins, Cobb's wren, black throated finch and many other species. When you reach the settlement of The McGills they offer coffee, tea and cakes.

Falkland islands - outpost and bone of contention by Regina Gehmlich

Stanley: Chosen as the new seat of government and first settled in the early 1840's, Stanley was picked for its sheltered harbour and access to abundant fresh water and peat for fuel. Initially surviving as a provisioning and repair stop for ships traveling around Cape Horn, Stanley achieved a notorious reputation as a haven for vagabond seamen and grizzled whalers. After the opening of the Panama Canal in 1914 and the switch from sail to steam, Stanley became increasingly dependent on the wool trade. Its notorious reputation long gone, the residents of Stanley have that hardy, cooperative friendliness often found in remote communities. One doesn't

have to leave Stanley to experience the wildlife of the Falklands. All kind of fauna can be found around town from sea lions and Peale's and Commerson's dolphins in the harbour to steamer ducks or upland geese holding up traffic (two or three cars on the same street would be considered traffic) while turkey vultures and Dominican gulls soar overhead.

South Georgia Biosecurity Self Audit Check list & Landing Declaration for all Visitors

Invasive animal and plant species pose a very real threat to South Georgia's fragile environment. By complying with the simple measures below you will personally be making a real and valuable contribution to the conservation of the island.

The biosecurity measures designed by South Georgia

Government are intended to protect the island by preventing the introduction or transfer between sites of any organic material including animals, plants, seeds, soil and diseases.

Please study carefully the following points.

• Have you scrubbed all of your footwear in the bootwashing station on board your vessel, removing all soil and organic material?

• Have you inspected all of your clothing for soil, seeds and insects, especially cuffs, Velcro, pockets, seams and hoods?

• Is all your equipment and luggage clean and free of soil and seeds? This includes walking sticks, ski poles and tripods for cameras.

• Have you emptied, vacuumed and inspected inside any bags that you plan to take ashore, to ensure absence of soil, seeds and insects?

• Have you removed all fresh produce, especially poultry products*, from any bags or garments that you intend to take ashore? (* In order to prevent the introduction of avian diseases)

Do you understand that you need to repeat the biosecurity self check procedure before landing at each new site?

• Have you seen anything which causes you concern? If so, please speak to your Expedition Leader or Officer in charge, who can raise it directly with the Government of South Georgia if necessary.

After the landing: Vacuuming for

backpacks and other things you will bring ashore on the next landing. You are able to use the vacuum system on deck 3 and 5. Remember to clean your rubber boots before you leave the landing site and disinfect at the cleaning station on tenderpit.

Afternoon We hope to do a

landing at Strømness. We will then begin our landing by calling group 4,5,6 and 7. Then we are going to have a break before the other groups are called. The break will be announced over the loudspeaker system. After the break we are ready for groups 8, 1,2,3. Listen carefully for the announcements for your group to be called. You need to wear rubber boots.

Please remember to stay at least 200 meters from the whaling station! There is no smoking anywhere on the island.

Remember to return to the landing site immediately if the ship's horn sounds

Please remember to cover your windows from light for the sake of the birds

Fortuna Bay was named not for the Roman Goddess of luck but for one of the first whaling ships in the area. The inaptly named Fortuna ran aground at Hope

Point in 1916 as her helmsman was reading a letter from home. Shackleton and his stalwart companions also came through here in 1916 in their slog from one side of South Georgia to the other. The bay is home to king penguins, gentoo penguins, fur seals, elephant seals and many flighted birds including albatross and southern giant petrels. King penguins prefer to nest at long, open beaches with large swell. The king penguin colony at Whistle Cove in Fortuna Bay is the most accessible on South Georgia.

Strømness Bay is home to the three deserted whaling stations; Strømness, Leith Harbour, and Husvik. Unfortunately, the station buildings cannot be entered for safety reasons but one can usually get close enough to acquire a sense of what they must have been like during their heyday. Elephant seals and fur seals are found along the beach. There is a small gentoo population as well as occasional king penguins. It was from the nearby station of Husvik that the entire staff volunteered to rescue Shakleton's 22 men stranded on Elephant Island. Setting out in Southern Sky, and the men of Husvik would not be able to get through the sea ice surrounding Elephant Island and it would take Shackleton four attempts and over four months to reach his men.

Founded by Norwegian Carl Anton Larsen in 1904, Grytviken was the first whaling station in Antarctic waters. Here it is possible to pay your respects to Sir Ernest Shackleton and others at the graveyard and visit the Whaler's Church. The manager's house became the South Georgia Whaling Museum in 1992 and is maintained by the British Antarctic Survey and the Government of South Georgia. The museum has a rich and fascinating display of whaling, sealing, exploring, and natural histories of the whole island. There is also a shop with a variety of souvenirs - they accept British pounds, Euros, American dollars, and Visa credit cards (no Amex). Grytviken is home to several derelict ships, including Petrel, an excellent surviving

example of a steam-powered whale-catcher. Just across the cove from Grytviken is King Edward Point, site of the former British Garrison and now home to a British Antarctic Survey applied fisheries research station as well as the Marine Officer, the Government's sole representative. The Marine Officer's duties include those of Harbour Master. Customs and Immigration, Fisheries Officer, and sub-Postmaster. Captain Larsen knew a good thing when he saw it; King Edward Cove is located in a protected corner of Cumberland East bay. The pier at Grytviken is very unstable however and landings usually occur on a beach set out by the Marine Officer.

The 3km long fine dark gets sanded beach only interrupted by some rivers flowing from the Heaney, Buxton and Cook Glaciers. Enjoy!

Antarctica, on average, is the coldest, driest, and windiest continent, and has the highest average elevation of all the continents. Antarctica is considered a desert, with annual precipitation of only 200 mm (8 inches) along the coast and far less inland. There are no permanent human residents, but

anywhere from 1,000 to 5,000 people reside throughout the year at the research stations scattered across the continent. Only cold-adapted plants and animals survive there, including penguins, seals, nematodes, tardigrades, mites, many types of algae and other microorganisms, and tundra vegetation. Belief in the existence of a Terra Australis – a vast continent in the far south of the globe to "balance" the northern lands of Europe, Asia and North Africa - has existed since the times of Ptolemy (1st century AD), who suggested the idea to preserve the symmetry of all known landmasses in the world. Depictions of a large southern landmass were common in maps such as the early 16th century Turkish Piri Reis map. Even in the late

17th century, after explorers had found that South America and Australia were not part of the fabled "Antarctica", geographers believed that the continent was much larger than its actual size. European maps continued to show this hypothetical land until Captain James Cook's ships, HMS Resolution and Adventure, crossed the Antarctic Circle on 17 January 1773, in December 1773 and again in January 1774

A name steeped in legend, Elephant Island is an icon for "Antarctics" the way Cape Horn is for mariners. This imposing and desolate island was home to 22 marooned members of Sir Ernest Shackleton's fabled 1914 Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition for four and a half months while they awaited rescue. Led by one of Antarctica's greatest unsung heroes John Robert Francis (known as Frank) Wild, the men barely survived living in horrible conditions beneath two overturned lifeboats. Named for Frank, Point Wild was originally known as Cape Wild and "Cape Bloody Wild" by the men stranded there. Point Wild is home to a small colony of hardy chinstrap penguins and a single bronze bust incongruously watching over them. The bust is of Captain Luis Pardo master of the Chilean Navy ship Yelcho that eventually rescued Shackleton's men.

The descriptively named Brown Bluff lies on the coast of the Antarctic Sound at the end of the Tabarin Peninsula. Curiously, the Tabarin Peninsula was named after Operation Tabarin, the British Naval expedition to establish territory on the Antarctic Peninsula. Adélie penguins, gentoo penguins, kelp gulls, and Cape petrels all breed here under an ominous, 745 metre-high (2450 feet) cliff. An even, stony beach with many rocky breaks often offers easy landings. Later in the season,

there are so many Adélies lounging on the beach that it may be impossible to land without disturbing them. Be aware that your landing site may change over the course of landing operations due to tides. Make sure to look for leopard seals patrolling the water off the beach. Experienced staff will tell you that the best way to experience an Adélie rookery is to sit quietly and just observe nature's greatest comedians at work., kelp gulls, blue-eyed shags also may be seen, but breeding is not confirmed.

The Antarctic Sound lies

between the very tip of the Antarctic Peninsula and D'Urville, Joinville, and Dundee Islands. The sound was not named for its location but rather for the ship Antarctic during Otto Nordenskjöld's 1903 Swedish South Polar Expedition, captained by Norwegian legend Carl Anton Larsen. Huge tabular icebergs from the ice shelves in the Weddell Sea are brought here in the Weddell's gyre-like currents. Known as "Iceberg Alley" by expedition staff, it is an astonishing assortment of floating ice both large and small. Although the 48 kilometre-long (30 mile) sound is often difficult to penetrate, it offers the most impressive array of ice that we are likely to see on our journey. The area is home to a high concentration of Adélie penguins with estimates as high as 500 000 nesting pairs. Emperor penguins are an extremely rare sight in the Antarctic Peninsula area. If you do see one, it will likely be floating by you on an ice floe in the Antarctic Sound.

Half Moon Island is a two-

kilometre long (1.2 mile), crescent-shaped island in the shadow of the picturesque mountains and glaciers of nearby Livingston Island. It is a favoured expedition stop for its large chinstrap penguin rookery. Other than a short hill, walking is generally easy. The serrated and crevassed cliffs are also home to Antarctic terns, kelp gulls, snowy sheathbills, and Wilson's storm petrels. Landings are usually made on an easily accessible, wide beach where an abandoned dory lies decaying. Once up the hill, there are magnificent views of Livingston Island and humpback whales have been spotted breeching in the water between the two islands. Down towards the western end of the beach is Teniente Camara station with its huge Argentine flags emblazoned on the orange buildings. The station has been sporadically staffed in recent years due to the Argentine economy. This will be our only opportunity to see chinstrap penguins in significant numbers.

A portion of the wall of the volcanic caldera of Deception Island has collapsed, flooding the interior and creating an amazing natural harbour known as Port Foster. Access to the interior is through the 200 metre-wide (660 feet) entrance known as Neptune's Bellows. There is a rock in the middle just under the water and the area to one side is foul. Therefore the ship will have merely 100 metres (330 feet) with which to navigate. Once safely through the Bellows, Whalers Bay will begin to appear off the starboard side of the ship. Whalers Bay was home to factory whaling ships as early as 1905 and a shore station named Hektor from 1912-1931 as well as British Base B built in 1941. Both the base and station were finally destroyed by a mudslide during the 1967-69 eruption along with a

Chilean base farther down Port Foster in Pendulum Cove. Today there are two stations in operation, Spain's Gabriel de Castilla and Argentina's Decepción.

The Errera Channel is a scenic, narrow waterway between Rongé Island and the Arctowski Peninsula on the mainland. It was discovered by the Belgica expedition and named for Professor Léo Errera of the University of Brussels, a benefactor of the voyage. Errera is home to Danco and Cuverville Islands.

Cuverville Island supports one of the largest known gentoo penguin colonies. This can be apparent from miles away given the right wind direction. Early in the season, snow cover impedes but doesn't stop penguins accessing their nests and an intricate network of "penguin highways" is carved into the snow. The shallow waters between Cuverville and Rongé islands often trap and ground icebergs. This makes for superb ship-cruising through the channel. Up from the rookery at Cuverville, steep cliffs lead to the island top. These cliffs should be avoided so as not to damage the mosses and lichens that grow there. The cliffs are also home to skuas that are vigorous in defending their well-hidden nests.

Danco is a one-mile (1.6km) long island lies in the southern part of the Errera Channel, off the western coast of Graham Land. Danco Island was first chartered by Gerlache and is named for the geophysicist who died during the Belgica expedition of 1897-99. Gentoo penguins are confirmed breeders and there is a minimum breeding population of approximately 1700 pairs. Snow algae may bloom. Snowy sheathbills, kelp gulls, blue-eyed shags also may be seen, but breeding is not confirmed.

Andvord Bay penetrates deep into the Antarctic Peninsula; from here the Weddell Sea side is a mere fifty kilometres (30 miles) away. Once inside the bay, one is surrounded on all sides by the mountains and glaciers alpine of the The bav peninsula. is splendidly scenic and fills with castellated icebergs and wildlife in the long days of the summer. Nestled at the bottom of the bay is Neko Harbour, named for a whaling ship which anchored there in the early 1900's. It is one of the rare places in the Antarctic Peninsula area where one can come ashore on the Antarctic mainland. Hike up the hill to the penguin rookery and an amazing view of Andvord Bay but do not continue onto the glacier as it is heavily crevassed. The glacier across the tiny harbour is very active and creates very impressive but dangerous waves when it calves - please stay off the beach.

The region we will sail in today was extensively explored by the Frenchman Jean-Baptiste Etienne Auguste Charcot in 1908-1910. He explored more than 1990 km (1240 miles) of previously unknown coastline. During his first expedition aboard the vessel Français in 1903-1905 he discovered Port Lockroy and Booth Island.

Port Lockroy: during Operation Tabarin in 1944, the British set up two bases in the Peninsula area to establish a permanent presence in the Antarctic. They set up Base 'A' at Port Lockroy, a known safe anchorage. Base 'B', was established at Whalers Bay, Deception Island. The base at Port Lockroy was operational until 1962 and then fell into disrepair. > in 1996 by the Antarctic Heritage Trust (AHT), Base 'A' on Goudier Island at Port Lockroy has become one of the most visited sites in Antarctica. It now operates as a museum, kept as it was in the 1950s, as well as a post office and souvenir shop with all proceeds going to the AHT, a non-profit organization dedicated to conserving this and other historical huts in Antarctica.

The Lemaire Channel was first sighted by Eduard Dallman in 1873 and then charted and traversed by Adrien de Gerlache in 1898. He named it for Charles Lemaire, a fellow Belgian who explored the Congo for King Leopold III. Given the right weather, this eleven kilometre-long (seven mile) and 1.6 kilometre-wide (one mile) channel can be strikingly beautiful. The steep cliffs and glaciers of Booth Island to one side mirror the opposite shores of the Antarctic Peninsula, When protected from the wind, the clear waters offer an extraordinary reflection of the mountains in the water; there can appear to be four different sets nudging each other. So many camera clicks can be heard during a traverse of the Lemaire Channel that it is known by expedition staff as the "Kodak Crack". Navigation of the channel is dependent upon ice conditions but one doesn't need to travel all the way down to experience its beauty.
